Why Reopening Offices is Critical to Our Businesses

## **Industry's Demonstrated Commitment to Fighting COVID-19**

The automotive industry has been a leader in the face of the COVID-19 pandemic. It has rallied to manufacture needed PPE equipment and implemented immediate safety protocols. Exemplary "Safe to Work" playbooks were institutionalized and shared across the industry.

These same safety protocols that were applied to manufacturing can be applied to office work. We know this because there is a proven success rate on the re-opening of manufacturing with minimal COVID transmissions, and some companies showing zero transmissions.

### **Strategic Collaboration is Key**

As Michigan faces a continued talent shortage for critical positions, professional development is now also stunted by the lack of in person work. Physical, technical, social, and resource strains are felt by remote workers to the extent that many suffer fatigue from isolation and excessive online meetings. They are missing that critical component of feeling part of something bigger.

Tension has grown between different areas of corporate and manufacturing personnel. Manufacturing has been on the front-line since the reopening while with offices closed the administrative and corporate staffs continue to work exclusively from home due to restrictions.

### Michigan's Competitiveness is at Stake

As a result of office closures, competitiveness of Michigan's automotive and mobility industry has potential to be threatened.

Companies that contribute to the success of Michigan's economic development are actively investigating moving their headquarters and other locations to a different state.
